The Official List of Cash Prizes offered to Exhibitors at the **Annual Kandiyohi County Fair,** August 9-10-11-12, 2023

- 1. Every exhibit must be entered in the name of the bona fide owners. Grain, vegetables, fruit and other exhibits must have been raised or made by the exhibitor during the present
- Exhibitors are required to have their exhibits entered by the entry clerk and delivered to their respective departments by 6:00pm, Tuesday, August 8, 2023. All Livestock entries must be in place by 10pm Tuesday, August 8, 2023. New Livestock Release time is Saturday, August 12 at 11pm or Sunday, August 13 at 10am; 4-H at 9am.
- ALL EXHIBITS MUST REMAIN IN PLACE AND NOT BE **REMOVED UNTIL II:00PM** the closing day of the fair. Failure to do this will result in the forfeiting of premiums.
- Any exhibit removed before I I:00pm on Saturday of the fair will forfeit all premiums, awards and trips, and the individual will not be allowed to exhibit at the Kandiyohi County Fair the following year. Any second violation of this rule will also exclude the individual from exhibiting at any future Kandiyohi County Fair.
- **ATTENTION LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS:**

There is security on the fairgrounds Saturday evening, so if exhibitors would like to avoid the hassle of loading/hauling animals after 9:00 P.M. Saturday, they may keep them overnight and bring them home Sunday morning. Because our traffic problem is so great on Saturday night, you cannot park your car near the exhibits. Any unattended and unauthorized car in the area of the 4-H, Exhibit 2, Home Improvement and Home Activities Buildings will be towed away. We do this for your protection as well as ours. We are under very strict fire and insurance regulations which MUST be followed.

- THERE WILL BE STAFF ON THE GROUNDS MONDAY, 9:00 AM to 2:00 PM. You may pick up your exhibit at that time also. If you need to make other arrangements, please call the fair office by Monday Noon, 235-0886.
- The Board of Managers reserves the right at any time to refuse entries, or prohibit the exhibition of animals or articles entered.
- No exhibit or animal shall compete for more than one premium except livestock competing in teams or groups. This rule shall not debar sweepstakes or special premium competition.
- Premiums will not be awarded on articles or animals of inferior merit, regardless of the number in competition.
- Any interference by exhibitors to influence the decision of a judge will be sufficient cause for excluding his entry from competition.
- Any appeal from a decision of a judge must be made to the superintendent, at the time of the award.
- Special premiums may be offered by interested parties for entries which conform to the general classification of the Fair Association.
- If the receipts should prove insufficient to meet all demands, the secretary reserves the right to first pay all bona fide expenses of the fair and, with the balance, pay premiums pro rated, according to the merits of the individual exhibit.
- Each division superintendent has complete charge of his division and his authority shall be respected. Each superintendent is barred from exhibiting in the division of which he is superintendent.
- The Board of Managers will take every precaution for the protection of exhibits; fire and police regulations will be followed and an ample police force will be in attendance, but the management will not be responsible for any loss that may occur.

The Kandiyohi County Fair Association wishes to promote a wholesome and educational event for the entire family. All exhibits and displays (FFA, 4-H, Open, Commercial) are subject to review by the Kandiyohi County Fair Association and the Kandiyohi County Fair Secretary. Any items or material which are deemed as inappropriate for display must be removed by exhibitor upon request by fair officials. The following list of items are included in the above ban:

 Weapons (death stars, butterfly knives)
 Sexually Explicit / Pornographic Material • Vulgar / Profane Materials. Exhibits and displays are meant to be enjoyed by all fairgoers. Please help us make the Kandiyohi County Fair a pleasant experience for people of all ages.

INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITS

Concessions & Privileges

INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITORS are requested to retain their exhibit until I I:00 p.m. the closing day of the Fair. Industrial Exhibitors will not be allowed, under any circumstances, to remove their displays prior to that time. Doing so will jeopardize their returning to the fair as an exhibitor the following year.

- 1. All persons desiring space for Industrial Exhibits, Concessions or Privileges will be required to make proper arrangements with the Secretary's office before being allowed to transact any business. The management reserves the right to cancel at any time, all contracts made with the concessionaire or others.
- 2. Each concessionaire must confine himself to the space assigned him. Failure to do this will subject him to forfeiture of his privilege without reimbursement. Handing out of any literature, including political, is prohibited on the grounds, except from space rented.

 3. The Board of Managers and Superintendent of Concessions will use every
- precaution to guard against extortion in any form practiced upon the patrons of the Fair. Any extortion practiced by a concessionaire will cause the forfeiture of contract money paid or expulsion from the grounds or both, as the Board of Managers may direct.
- 4. All places serving food or refreshments or other stands must be substantial in structure and neat in appearance and comply with food inspectors.
 BEGINNING ON THE OPENING DAY OF THE FAIR each concessionaire
- shall keep posted in a conspicuous manner at the front or entrance of his place of business, throughout the period of the Fair, a neatly PRINTED OR PAINTED SIGN, showing price of meals, lunches and all articles of food and drink to be sold and services performed under the contract.
- 6. The sale of alcoholic beverage or liquor is strictly prohibited. Any violation of this rule will be severely dealt with.
- 7. All Industrial Exhibitors and Concessionaires must keep their space in a sanitary condition, by removing all refuse, placing the same in the garbage containers, and all containers must be placed where employees of the Fair may get to them with ease. Garbage pickup is at 6:00 a.m. each day.
- 8. Concessionaires and their help must be neat and tidy in their dress. Persons found working at any concession not complying with this rule, may be ordered off the grounds.
- 9. A violation of any of the terms and stipulations of the concession contract, verbal or written, shall cause the full amount of the contract to become due, and work a revocation and forfeiture of all rights and privileges therein granted to the concessionaire in which event all sums paid or contracted to be paid become the property of the lessor as liquidated damages for said breach. The lessor shall have a lien upon all property being kept, used or situated upon leased premises on the Kandiyohi County Fair Grounds, whether such property be exempt or not, for any unpaid rents, and damages sustained by breach of contract by said lessee. The lessor shall have the right to detain such property without process of law and appropriate said property to the use of said lessor to satisfy all claims.

 ELECTRIC POWER, LIGHTS AND WIRING

- 1. All electric wiring will be performed under the supervision of the Superintending Electrician, Baker Electric, appointed and under contract to the Kandiyohi County Fair.
- 2. All concession wiring must be done in a safe and workmanlike manner, and cutout must be provided for the entrance to each concession.
- Electrical hook-up, power and light charges will be made on the basis of the actual cost to the Fair, unless the concession or privilege is based upon a flat piece basis, which will include all electrical services.
- 4. All electrical bills will be billed and collected by the official Electrician, Baker Electric. These will be due on the completion of any work done by them.

Attention Livestock Producers!

- —Kandiyohi County Fair Association has been notified that the IRS has the right to come on the fairgrounds any time during the fair and inspect diesel trucks for dyed off-the-road diesel fuel.
- —Livestock producers wishing to avoid the hassle of loading out their animals after 11pm Saturday may leave their animals at the fairgrounds until Sunday morning. Fairgrounds security is provided Saturday evening.
- —Exhibitors wishing to park their cattle trailers at the fairgrounds for the duration of the fair will need to purchase a special parking permit at a fee of \$10. These trailers will be required to park in a specially marked area for cattle trailers.

- All entries must be made with the clerk on the date specified in each division so that ample stall and pen may be provided.
- All livestock exhibits must be in place by 10:00pm Tuesday, August 8, 2023. Holstein show will follow Holstein Show Rules.
- Pen and stall room will be assigned by the superintendent in charge, according to entries made with the clerk. The exhibitor will use these as assigned.
- 4. Any fraud or misrepresentation shall cause the forfeiture of premium.
- When there is but one entry in a class, prize money and ribbons shall be awarded as merits of exhibits may warrant.
- Certificates of registration must be shown where called for except in case of young animals not yet registered where certificates of sire and dams are sufficient.
- 7. All animals must be entered in the name of the OWNER
- 8. All stalls must be cleaned by 9 a.m. so that refuse may be carted away before visitors arrive, and the superintendents are instructed to strictly enforce this rule.
- No animals having serious blemish, hereditary unsoundness or contagious disease will be allowed to compete. Decision to be made by official veterinarian.
- Any animal that the superintendent feels is NOT of show quality, said superintendent may request said animal be removed from the grounds.
- Violation of rules will cause forfeiture of premium. Anyone interfering with the judges in any way will cause all premiums won by the animals owned by such disturbing party to be forfeited.
- 12. Appeals from the decision of judges and the superintendent must be made in writing within five hours to the board of acting superintendents of the stock departments. Each appeal must be accompanied by \$5.00, which will be forfeited if the appeal is not sustained.
- 13. All possible production measures will be taken but the association will not be responsible for loss of exhibit by fire or otherwise.
- An exhibitor with 1-4 head is entitled to one Pass; with 5 head, 2 passes.

These MUST BE SECURED from the Livestock Clerk or Superintendent (not Secretary).

- Entry fees, stall and pen rent must be paid before the animals can be judged.
- 16. Animals entered in the 4-H or F.F.A. Departments are eligible to enter Open Class competition, providing the animal(s) have received a blue ribbon in 4-H or FFA.
- 17. Any exhibit removed before 11:00pm on Saturday of the fair will forfeit all premiums, awards & trips, and the individual will not be allowed to exhibit at the Kandiyohi County Fair the following year any second violation of this rule will also exclude the individual from exhibiting at any future Kandiyohi County Fairs.
- 18. There is security on the fairgrounds Saturday evening, so if exhibitors would like to avoid the hassle of loading/hauling animals after 11:00 P.M. Saturday, they may keep them overnight and bring them home Sunday morning.

2023 Exhibition of Livestock and Poultry in Minnesota

Summary of State Rule

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

The exhibition management may adopt more but not less restrictive health requirements than re-

quired by state rule.

Livestock or poultry known by the exhibitor to have an infectious, communicable disease or to have been exposed to an infectious, communicable disease, or to be from a **quarantined herd** or flock may not be entered in an exhibition. **Warts and ringworm** are considered communicable diseases. Therefore, livestock affected by these diseases cannot be exhibited. A statement from a veterinarian than an animal is being treated for these diseases is not acceptable.

All livestock will be **inspected** by the Official Veterinarian on the opening day of the exhibition and daily during the exhibition. The Official Veterinarian will order the immediate removal to a quarantine facility or removal from the exhibition premises of any livestock with symptoms of infectious or communicable diseases. Animals placed in a quarantine facility must remain there until removed from the exhibition premises. They may not enter a show ring. This includes livestock with **warts or ringworm**.

All testing must be conducted prior to the exhibition, and a record of the test results on a test chart or Intrastate Health Certificate must accompany the tested animals.

Livestock and poultry entered in a **petting exhibit** are not exempt from the exhibition rules if the animals are from more than one farm or there are other animals at the exhibit.

SWINE The previously required pseudorabies test will only be required for hogs originating from outside Minnesota or from one of the 10 counties with a Phase 3 status. Hogs originating from outside Minnesota or from Rock, Nobles, Jackson, Watonwan, Waseca, Blue Earth, Martin, Faribault, Freeborn or Mower counties must have a negative pseudorabies test. "Originated" means that all hogs born in one of the above 10 counties need to be pseudorabies tested. In other words, a 4-H hog purchased from a breeder in one of the above 10 counties but raised by a 4-H family in one of the remaining 77 counties would need to be tested.

SHEEP Scrapies concerns in the sheep industry have caused the creation of a National Scrapie Eradication Program. Breeding Ewes (any age) and Market Ewe Lambs need to be tagged with an official premise tag with unique serial number. These official tags can be ordered from the Minnesota Board of Animal health at 651-296-2942 (ext. 30) or toll free at 866-873-2824 (ext. 30). There is no cost for the tags. Wether lambs do not need to be tagged. These official tags are in addition to the Minnesota 4-H ID tags also required. No health papers are required for the State Fair 4-H Sheep Show.

GOATS Scrapies concerns also exist in goats. Goats are in the educational phase of the process. There will be no requirements for official premise tags for State Fair goats. However, this may well be added for the 2022 show season. 4-H goat exhibitors should be advised to request official premise tags with unique serial numbers for all sexually intact goats they purchase. Official tags can be ordered from (and official tags registered with) the Minnesota Board of Animal Health at 651-296-2942 (ext. 30) or toll free at 866-873-2824 (ext. 30). There is no cost for the tags.

BEEF, DAIRY, POULTRY, RABBITS

Animals must meet the Minnesota Importation requirements in addition to the requirements outlined in this summary. Health certificates must list the Minnesota Exhibitioas consignee and will be accepted if examination and tests are conducted within 90 days prior to the exhibition, except swine pseudorabies tests, which must be made

within 30 days. The differential pseudorables tests are not approved for exhibition.

SLAUGHTER CLASSES (Terminal Shows)

No health certificate, test or individual identification is needed if animals are isolated in a separate building from all other classes and all animals are slaughtered during or immediately following the exhibition. Common unloading chutes, alleys, and scales may not be used. A common show ring may be used if the slaughter class is shown last.

DOGS

Dogs over 6 months of ages must be accompanied by a current Certificate of Rabies Vaccination issued by a Licensed Veterinarian.

Exhibit Preparation Tips

To assist in selecting and preparing vegetables for exhibit, the following suggestions are made: uniform size; shape; color; free of insects; disease and, mechanical damage.

Carrots, Parsnips, Beets, Turnips,

Rutabagas — Root crops should be mature but not overgrown, pithy or coarse in texture. Tops trimmed of 1 1/4" above the crown. Side roots trimmed off but not the tap root. Clean by brushing.

Broccoli — Heads should be dark or purplish green and compact. Avoid yellow flowers in head. Stems cut about 5" from top of head.

Cabbage — Stems cut about 1/2" below the head. Remove blemished or broken leaves. Leave few wrapper leaves.

Cauliflower — Heads should be white, compact and free of small leaves and ricy texture. Stems cut so as to leave 4-6 leaves. Trim outer leaves 1/2" above the white head. Use soft bristled brush to remove dirt from head.

Collection of Herbs — Cut herbs, label and put varieties in individual bottles of water.

Cucumbers — Pickling - select fruits 3-5" long. Specimens should be same stage of maturity & uniform in size, shape & color. Slicing - select fruits that are straight, dark green, 6-10" long and uniform in shape, size and color. Leave stems attached. Soft brush clean.

Egg Plant — Uniform in color, free from bronzing & greening, stem left on.

Kohlrabi — Roots removed just below the ball. Remove all but the center 4-6 leaves. Specimens best if uniform, medium size and not hard or woody. Skin clean, but not washed.

Muskmelon — Select mature but not overripe fruits that separate easily from vines.

Onions — Have specimens mature and thoroughly cured. Neck should be small. Do not peel to give a slick appearance. Outer scales that are discolored or broken should be removed. Small basal roots should be left intact but trimmed to a uniform length of 1/2" long.

Onions, Green — Peeled roots, trimmed tops to uniform 6-8"

Peas — A select bright green well-filled pods with seeds in the best eating stage. Do not wash.

Peppers — Stem should be left 1/2" to 1 inch long.

Sweet Corn — Select well-filled ears with kernels that are milky and juicy with husks that are to remain, allow a short shank.

Tomatoes — Uniform size, shape and color. Fruits should be uniform, free of cracks and blemishes, with stems removed.

Watermelons — Select fruit that are mature but not overripe. Leave 1" of stem on.

Winter Squash & Pumpkins — Select mature specimens where the rind resist pressure of the thumbnail. Fruits uniform in size, shape, color and free of defects. Leave stems attached to fruits.

Blooms should be near or "at peak," never overbloomed for best exhibit, cut off dead blossoms and seed heads.

Read your handbook well; take care to enter exhibits in the proper class. A specimen will be disqualified if it has more or less stems, sprays, blooms, etc., than the number specified in the handbook. A bud showing color is classified as a flower.

Definitions:

ANNUAL – A plant that completes its outdoor

cycle of growth in one year.

PERENNIAL – A plant that lives, blooms, and seeds for more than two years.

SCAPE – The whole stem of the flower. Example: Daylily

SPIKE -length of stem or stalk, usually unbranched and elongated bloom. Example: Gladiolus, or Snap

SPRAY - Portion of a plant with a number of flowers on one stem. Example: Cosmos.

STEM - The main ascending part of a plant. Example: Tea Rose, Carnation.

BLOOM – Individual flowers, one blossom on a stem. Example: Nasturtium.

SPECIMEN – A single plant, bloom, spike, spray,

stalk or stem.

Rules To Be Observed by Exhibitors:

The superintendent of flowers shall have the power to determine either at the time entry is made or at the time exhibit is staged as to the eligibility of entrant. Only amateurs are permitted to enter.

Enter the exact number of stems or blossoms called for in each exhibit. Flowers will be judged on quality. No filler should be used other than in arrangements. Choice and taste of material will be considered in all arrangements.







Kandiyohi County Fair Policies

- **Vehicles, golf carts, 4-wheelers, gators** and the like which are for the express use of fair personal during fair time (week) are only to be driven by County Fair personnel, board members, office staff and volunteers designated to use such units. Underage member of board members, families, staff families are not permitted to operate these
- Use of motorized vehicles on fair grounds during fair week ... limited only to golf cars, 4-wheelers, gators and the like which are in use by the Kandiyohi County Fair board and staff will be permitted during fair week. All other private units which maybe brought to or driven to the grounds will NOT BE permitted. Insurance coverage
- will NOT allow private units on the grounds. **Dogs or other pets** It shall be the policy, that during the period of the Kandiyohi County Fair, no dogs or other pets shall be allowed on the fair grounds. These are exceptions;

 - 1. Certified service animals or secured animals in training.
 2. Dogs or other pets may be allowed when part of an exhibition or demonstration authorized by the secretary.
- . Carnival owner/operators dogs must be housed during fair hours.
- **Livestock producers** wishing to avoid the hassle of loading out their animals after 9pm Saturday may leave their animals at the fairgrounds until Sunday morning. Fairgrounds security is provided Saturday evening. **Cattle Trailers** Exhibitors wishing to park their cattle trailers at the fairgrounds for the duration of the fair will need
- to purchase a special parking permit at a fee of \$10.00. These trailers will be required to park in a specially marked area for cattle trailers
- Designated Protest Area The cement pad by the Wash Rack Area along the lake, west of the Sheep/Hog Barn has

- been designated as a Protest Area.

 The Kandiyohi County Fair Association recognizes that the presence of gangs, gang activity, and gang affiliations can cause a disruption of, or interfere with fair activities and fair safety. Gang activity, identifiers, or membership is contrary to the mission of the Kandiyohi County Fair.

 Canadiantifier which provide proprietically as a figure activity in county.
- Gang identifiers, which may change periodically, are signs, gestures, insignias, symbols, colors or combinations of colors, clothing, and wearing apparel or accessories which are intended to publicly demonstrate an affiliation of a student with a gang.
- Examples of gang identifiers include, but are not limited to: gang colors, tattoos, bandannas, "do-rags," sweatbands, gang clothing, jewelry, emblems, badges, symbols, signs, 5 or 6 pointed stars, arrows, pitch-forks, crowns, identifying numbers (i.e. 5, 6, 13, 14, 7-4, XIII, XIV), groups of names, initials, acronyms, playboy bunny insignia, a single glove, a heart with: wings, horns, tail, or any combination thereof, drama or theater masks, praying hands, martini glass, top hat, cane dollar sign, gang expressions (i.e. "amor de rey," "all is well," "all is one," "mi vida loca," "my crazy life," "vato loco," "crazy one," "Folks," "People," "BOS," "MOB," "Free Larry {Larry Hoover-founder of the Gangster Disciples}, etc.), notches in eyebrows.
- The administration may add to the list of identifiers at any time.

 Any combination of clothing which, upon guidance from law enforcement agencies, commonly signifies gang identity, membership, or affiliation is prohibited. Public may not wear, or display, any gang identifiers while on fair property, or at fair-sponsored activi-
- Wearing pants below the waist line (sagging) is not allowed.
- Belt buckles with any initials are prohibited.
- Belt buckles with any initials are prohibited.

 Wearing an over-sized belt with one end hanging down is prohibited.

 Gang related hats, baseball type caps, or other gang related head gear may not be worn, nor worn in a tilted or cocked position, on fair property or at fair-sponsored activities. An official fair cap (approved by the association) representing the current fair of residence may be worn.

 NOTE: Gang members will wear the hat with the brim titled or cocked to one side showing affiliation to the tilted side. This may be done in the front or the back of the head. At times the brim may be straight forward or hardwards that the aptive hat may be stridtly at the most in the tilted to go cide. They also wear streking caps in the
- forward or backwards but the entire hat may be tilted to one side. They also wear stocking caps in the same way, with an emblem or a patch as a replacement for the brim of a baseball cap. It is true that this has become a fashion trend, but it is important to remember that the trend came from the "Gang Culture" and still signifies affiliation with the gang culture as the kids want to appear "Gangster" looking.

Tobacco & Electronic Device PolicyThe Kandiyohi County Fair Board adopted a "County Fair Tobacco Policy" on July 11, 2011 and revised the policy on May 1, 2012. Prohibiting tobacco use serves to protect the health, safety and welfare of ALL fairgoers and animals at our county fair. Thank You for not using tobacco!

On June 1, 2015 the Kandiyohi County Fair Board revised the policy to also include prohibiting the use of Electronic Delivery Devices under the same guidelines as the "County Fair Tobacco Policy."

Tobacco use (in any form i.e. cigarettes, chew, snus, pipes, cigars, etc.) is prohibited in all enclosed buildings, all entities which have a cover/top above them and within 20 feet of all entrances to these buildings and entities inside the grounds of the Kandiyohi County Fair during the four day fair. This is also the same for the use of electronic delivery device which shall mean any product containing or delivering nicotine, lobelia or ANY other substance intended (or not intended) for human consumption or that can be used by a person to simulate smoking through inhalation of vapor. Electronic delivery device shall include any component part of such a product; this includes the use of E-Cigarettes, e-cigars, e-pipes, or any and all other devices that are used for the purpose of inhalation.

Designated Tobacco & Electronic Device Free areas include:

- Designated Todacco & Electronic Device Free areas Include:

 All enclosed buildings with walls and a roof and within 20 feet of the entrances.

 All buildings which house animals/livestock and within 20 feet of the entrances.

- —All entities which have a cover or top over them (i.e. tents) and within 20 feet of the entrances.

 —Grandstand area and within 20 feet of the entrances.

 —An area where there is a large gathering of people and within 20 feet of the gathering.

 —Area's where live events are occurring (Lumberjack show, pig races, etc.) and within 20 feet of the areas. The Tobacco and Electronic Delivery Device Policy applies to all employees, volunteers, independent contractors and members of the general public while attending the Kandiyohi County Fair. The policy will be enforced by the Fair Board with the assistance of the Kandiyohi County Drug Free Communities (DFC) Coalition and the Students Working against Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs (SWAT) Teams. Peer enforcement is also encouraged. Signs are posted throughout the fair to inform fair-goers of the tobacco and electronic device policy.

Any person found violating the policy will be asked to refrain from the use of the tobacco and/or electronic device or face immediate removal from the fair grounds and re-admittance will not be allowed that day





UNMANNED AERIAL VEHICLE (DRONE) POLICY

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to establish procedures for the use of an unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV), also known as a drone, for any purpose and by any person at any Kandiyohi County Fair (KCF) event. For purposes of this policy, an UAV is any aircraft without a human pilot aboard the device. This policy will also be used to assist the KCF in promoting safety, reducing injuries, and complying with federal, state, local laws, regulations, policies and the KCF, In addition, the KCF recognizes its responsibility to regard to the protection of the privacy rights of patrons as provided in federal law and state statutes.

II. GENERAL STATEMENT OF POLICY

Any use of an UAV must be pre-approved in writing by the KCF Board President or designee. The KCF Board President or designee shall refuse admission or entry to anyone attempting to use an unauthorized UAV; and if necessary, the President or designee shall remove anyone attempting to use an unauthorized UAV and/or confiscate the UAV. This applies to all KCF ground property. This also includes all buildings and grounds used and or KCF sponsored events and activities, instructional or otherwise.

III. GUIDELINES

- a. KCF personnel shall refuse admission or entry to anyone attempting to use an unauthorized UAV.
 b. KCF personnel will report UAV activity on KCF ground property to a KCF Board member.
 c. When possible, KCF personnel shall confiscate an unauthorized UAV used on the KCF ground prop-

erty. IV. RULES AND PROCEDURES

- Any person wishing to operate an UAV on KCF property, for any purposes, must seek permission form the KCF Board President or designee.
- Requests for permission must be submitted in writing at least one week prior to the date of use.
- The KCF Board President or designee, at his or her discretion, can grant exception to this policy so long as no federal or state laws, regulations or policies are violated. If permission is granted, UAV's must comply with and follow safety guidelines outlined in AC 91-57A, which include:

 1. Fly at or below 400 feet and remain clear of surrounding obstacles.

 2. Keep the aircraft within visual line of sight at all times.
- - Remain well clear of and do not interfere with manned aircraft operations.

 - Flying an aircraft that weighs 55 lbs. or more is prohibited.
 Flying an aircraft that weighs 55 lbs. or more is prohibited.
 Being careless or reckless with the unmanned aircraft is prohibited individuals could be fined for endangering people or other aircraft.
 The UAV must be properly registered.
